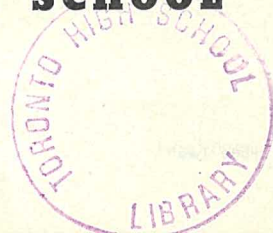

Headmaster's Message

ENDEAVOUR

Sirius, Argo, Victory and Endeavour are the names of the Houses of Toronto High School, taken from the names of famous ships. Endeavour was the ship of Captain James Cook, R.N., and represented for him in the late eighteenth century, just as it does for us today "the physical and intellectual exertion towards the attainment of some object."

Captain Cook gave his very best and his life in his attempt to discover the secret of the unknown South Land; his navigational journeys were far from complete when he was murdered by natives in the Sandwich, now Hawaiian Islands. His was a life of training, work and endeavour, uncrowned in his lifetime, but well appreciated by posterity.

The spirit exists today, exemplified in the Olympic tradition, that the important thing is to participate, not to win. There is much unrewarded effort in life and in school—in parents' preparation of children, in their provision of a secure home with training in manners and morals; in the pupil's attention to his lessons in his conduct and in his development of the kind of ideals which will keep him steady in stormy times at school and later.

We know that everyone cannot be top of the class or win the race, yet everyone can enter and do his best, make his best endeavour—to his own credit as well as to the credit of his home and school.

We of the P. & C. wish the students every success in the coming examinations and ask that they endeavour to uphold the honour and prestige of the school and set a standard that will forever be a challenge to those who follow in their footsteps.

HOME ECONOMICS AT TORONTO HIGH SCHOOL

We are very fortunate at this school in having modern, well-equipped rooms for the teaching and study of Home Economics. In this world of ours, our presence is often noticed when many varied and tempting odours diffuse through our kitchens and find their way to the first floor class rooms.

However, these mostly delectable odours are not the basis of our studies. Most people are of the opinion that Home Economics is "learning how to cook." This is a sad understatement, for in this subject the future homemakers of tomorrow are moulded. Our subject is divided into four sections:—

1. Nutrition
2. Homemangement
3. Laundry
4. Cookery

NUTRITION is the study of food values, quantities, qualities and functions of food in the human body. This knowledge is taught to ensure correct planning, preparing and serving of balanced, healthy meals by modern housewives.

HOMEMANAGEMENT ensures that girls are capable of managing a normal household under normal, average conditions. Girls are trained in modern techniques and methods of budgeting family finance, executing household tasks by time and labour-saving methods, planning sensible and economical homes and furnishings, establishing ideal family habits and social relationships.

Our goal is for a better world of home living. If girls are given careful guidance and training in their early years, they will surely manage more successfully the homes of tomorrow.

LAUNDRY work is a task every housewife and girl encounters regularly. To ensure longer life and neater appearances from clothing, basic techniques and methods are taught in laundry classes at school.

COOKERY lessons are enjoyed by all pupils who take Home Economics. The principle of cookery is to carefully plan, prepare and cook food by methods which cause the least loss of food value.

Food is an expensive item in a housewife's budget, therefore care must be taken to ensure that food is not wasted in any way or form. By learning proper, easy methods of cooking food, one is assured of obtaining maximum food value for moneys spent.

There is a wealth of knowledge and enjoyment to be obtained from the subject "Home Economics" and all who study it, either in the form of Craft or Home Economics, will be more efficient, happy housewives of tomorrow.

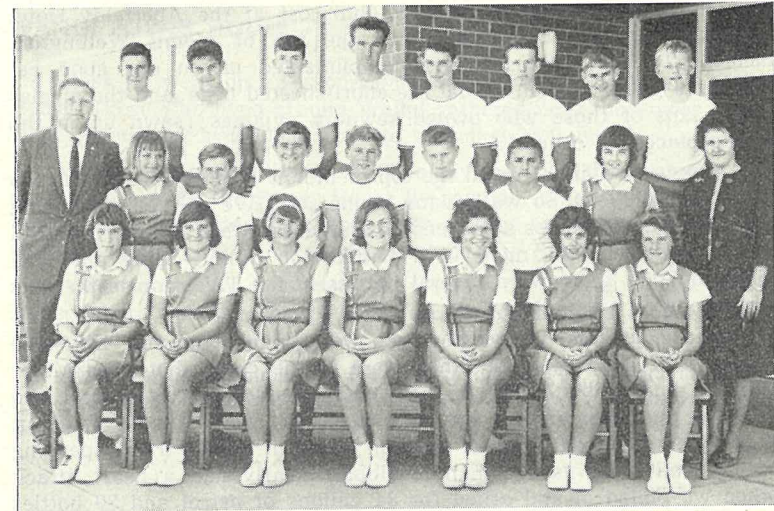

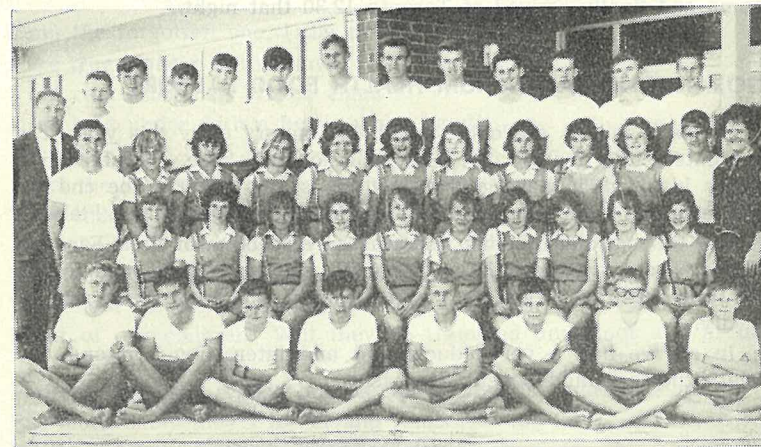
A feature of the trip was our journey to the top of the Power House where we were able to look over the surrounding area and take pictures.

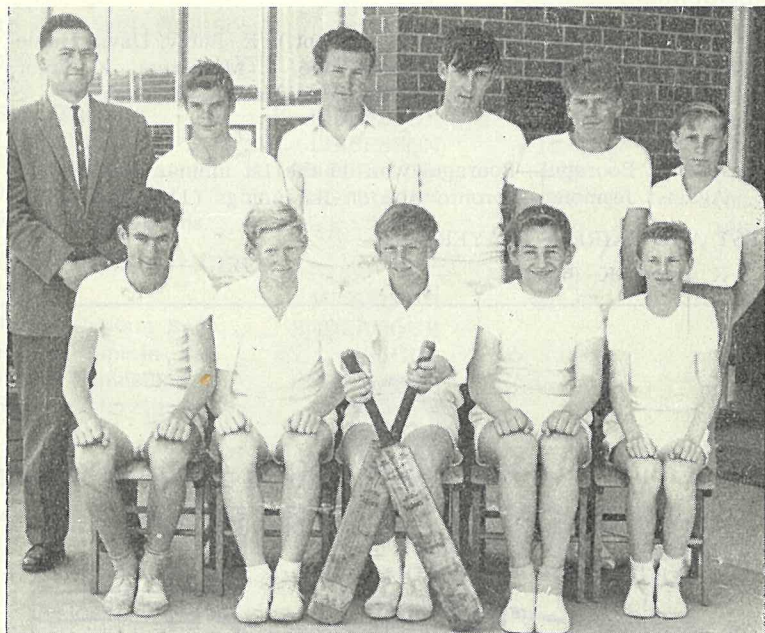
Despite an uninspiring performance in their initial match against Booragul, the members of our team were undaunted and thoroughly redeemed themselves in their game against Jesmond.

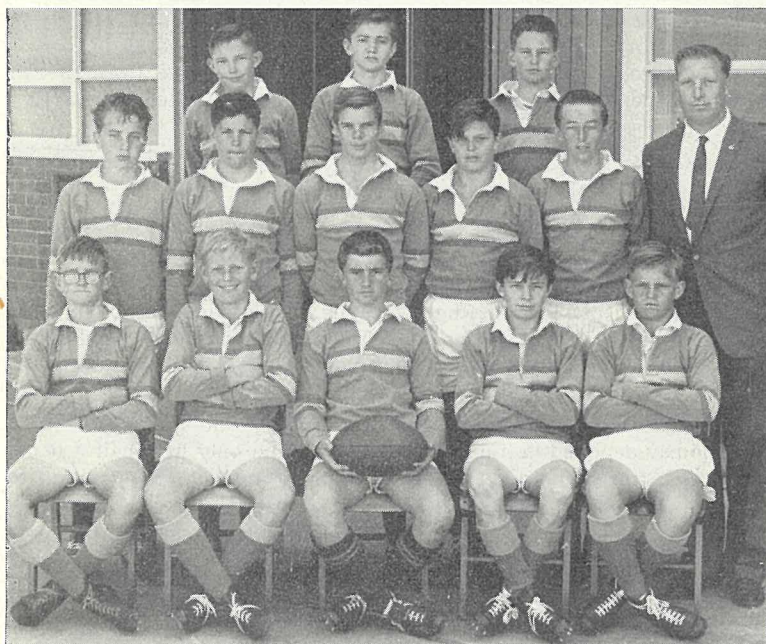
