

On behalf of our School's Parents and Citizens' Association, I have much pleasure in submitting this brief report covering some of the present activities of the Association for the current year.





TASMANIAN TRIP



THE ESKIMO

Is the name given to the people living along the Arctic Circle — Greenland, Alaska, North America and across the Bering Sea on a small part of the coast of Asia. The name is said to be derived from one of two sources — (a) From the Abnaki Algonquian name "Esquimantsic," meaning "the eaters of raw flesh," or (b) A French missionary term meaning the excommunion ones. The Eskimo call themselves the "Innuit." They are of short stature, muscular build and light brown complexion, with broad flattish faces.

In the history of the world, the Eskimo have an important place. They were the first people to find a way to live in an extremely cold climate without firewood and therefore, to live in a previously uninhabited part of the world. They are a bright, economical and inventive people, who use the few natural resources available to them to their greatest advantage. Their major tools for survival are the blubber lamp, their clothing, fishing equipment, and the famous snow dome (or igloo), all of them invented several hundred years ago. The blubber lamp, carved out of soap stone or made of pottery, burns the blubber of the whale either for fuel or light. They fashion their tools mostly with flint.

The fur suit is made by the women. The suit is made with a ulu, a knife much like that used by leather workers everywhere. The suit contains 12 pieces, some are a parka with a hood, a pair of trousers, mittens, and boots. The boots have fur inside as well as outside.

To make a springlike apparatus used to kill wolves, the Eskimo shapes a strip of whalebone into a flat, double edged skewer. The wolf eats it and when the fat melts, the whalebone springs open, killing the wolf.

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

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
BASKETBALL REPORT




SUMMER SPORT

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
