



The award is in the form of a pocket to be worn on the school blazer or in the form of a pennant. On the pennant, the sport which the 'Blue' is awarded is shown

HOW THE BLUE IS AWARDED

The condtions governing the award of Blues are as follows:

- (a) A Blue can be gained only once in any particular sport by a candidate.
- (b) For a sport concerned, a candidate must be a member of the School's First Grade Team and possess above average ability.
- (c) For the award of an athletics and swimming Blue a candidate must qualify for membership of the School's Senior Athletics or Senior Swimming division. An important factor would be the gaining of a place in any event (Final) of the Senior Division at the Newcastle Area Athletics or Swimming Carnivals.

In all cases the quality of the sportsmanship together with attitude and general behaviour both on and off the field of play are very important factors to be considered by the committee.
