


Classes have also had slide programmes on such topics as the Rhine, Baden-Wurttemberg, Switzerland, the Riviera and Marseille.



REPORT ON NOEL

Noel is currently attending Catonsville High School near Baltimore, Maryland. The total enrolment at the school, which caters for grades 10, 11 and 12, is 1400 and there are 470 students in the graduating class.

Catonsville has a population of 60,000 and many of the residents have moved there during the past 25 years due to the growth of the aeroplane electronics industries and the relocation and growth of government agencies.

It is basically a middle to upper-middle class community 40 miles from Washington D.C. Cultural opportunities in the town include a local Concert Association, Baltimore Symphony series, plays and musical productions presented by amateur groups, musical events held at the local cummunity college and university and community art exhibits. It is largely a white community with a smaller negro community near its centre. In recent years there have been serious attempts to break down racial barriers.


The school curriculum emphasizes general academic and commercial studies. Wide diversity of courses for student interest are offered, including speech, creative writing, drama and journalism. Offered are 5 years of Spanish and French, with German, Italian, Esperanto and Hebrew offered as foreign language appreciation.

Science courses range from basic science to physics, with honours courses in Chemistry and Physics. Drafting woodshop and auto mechanics are offered as trade courses.

All types of commercial courses are offered. A wide variety of clubs may be joined and all sports except swimming and ice hockey are offered.

JOHN'S REPORT FROM HOBART, **OKLAHOMA**

eight months and I have loved every minute of my time here. Hobart is a small rural community (population 5,000) in the heart of the wheat and cotton belt in S.W. Oklahoma. The Texas border is only 30 miles away so the people of Hobart here. My first family, the Pfennings, are farmers, have a very pronounced southern accent.

Oklahoma was one of the last states created in the U.S. and did not achieve statehood until 1906. Before that it had been Indian Territory. Oklahoma has the largest number of Indians of

(and 15% negro). Hobart High, which I attend, has 300 students in 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th years and the students in those years are called Freshmen, Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors. When I arrived here in January I was placed in the Senior class and at the end of the semester, in May, I was allowed to graduate with that class. The graduation ceremony was held in the Baptist Church because it is the largest building in town and all the graduating Seniors had to march down the

(-6 degrees C) and snowing and it kept snowing on and off for the next two months.

My second host family were Dr. and Mrs. Bynum. They are both quite young and have no children.
