
#### YEAR 12 GEOGRAPHY FIELD STUDIES

four weeks to assist in the canteen.

The women who have helped at the canteen over the years should be very happy with the results of the efforts as by the end of this year over \$90,000 has been raised and spent on school requirements.



During first term, while Mrs. Fenwick and Mrs. Wright were away, I was very grateful for the able support provided by relief clerical assistants, Mrs. Barbara Hartley, Mrs. Geraldine Friehaut, Mrs. Joan Patrick and Mrs. Lorraine Stanger.

Book Week 1979 was again a highlight of Library activities for the year. The theme this year was 'Build With Books', displays of posters,

handcrafts, decorated cakes; three outstanding posters were prepared by boys from 8R. The Class collection for books to be donated to the Library by each class raised \$70.97 and the cake stall raised \$13.76. A new feature for Book Week this year was the morning tea held for Library Prefects and their parents on the last day of Book Week. Mrs. Mason presented the Prefects with their badges. A book sale of paperback books was held as part of Book Week and many books were sold to students and staff.

Another special occasion was a birthday party for all horses, held on 1st August; there were displays of posters, drawings, models, riding

gear and old photographs.

A new activity this year has been the sale of posters; 50 posters were purchased for the Library, featuring attractive designs and scenes and stimulating, thought-provoking and humourous captions. The posters have proved very popular with students and staff and 250 posters were ordered. It is intended that this sale of posters will be a regular feature of library activities.

The Library has been used again this year for displays of art, needlework handicrafts; also for debates and other inter-school activities. We have also proved that it is possible to grow indoor plants in the Library and the eight specimens we have at present are flourishing. Displays are arranged for P. & C. meetings which are held in the Library.

During the year several books have been donated to the Library to commemorate Anzac

Day, Legacy Day, etc. Since writing the last tenerit the Library collection has been increased by 1201 items; a considerable number of new kits, slides, filmstrips, etc. have been purchased and are being well used by staff and students. The collection of video tapes and audio cassettes continues to grow and is proving very useful as a teaching aid. Borrowings from the Library have ranged between 400 and 500 per week and the Library is used for most periods each day.

A new photo-copier, a Minolla, was purchased at the beginning of third term last year, it is used extensively and produces very good copies.

Planned activities for the remainder of 1979 include Map Week, 10-14th Sept., Carnival '79 = a sharing of Cultures, Sept. 15-21st. Australia Library Week and Australia Book Week in October.

We appreciate the support of the Canteen Committee for the School Library; books are becoming increasingly expensive and it may be necessary next year to explore additional sources of support. We have we will continue to be able to make the Library an attractive, interesting and stimulating place in which to work.







In 1975 Rick was the Under 14 N.S.W. State Chess Champion and in 1977 became the Under


16 City of Sydney Chess Champion.

They were approached by the Russians for their Western money to buy goods in the tourist shops and one soldier wanted to exchange his medals for the jeans Chris was wearing.

He was also taken to Hamburg, travelling down through Stockholm and Copenhagen, where he used his German and was understood quite readily — a feat which pleased him no end.

On 22nd May, Chris and four American students set out on a month's Inter-rail trip through several countries, hostelling it where possible and also camping if the weather pemitted

The weather was terribly cold (-36°) when he was first in Finland but it has even reached 19° on one day recently. As the sun is setting at 10 p.m. and rising again at about 3 a.m., he is having trouble sleeping.

Chris has given several addresses at the school, has been to the Technical College and has addressed a small gathering of Rotarians, showing slides of Australia. On this occasion he gave his first speech in Finnish — 1½ minutes!

1979 proved to be the best year for Toronto High in track and field athletics for many years.

The school carnival reached an all time high in athletics standards with 31 records being broken, with competition in all events and all age groups being keenly contested. This year was probably the most difficult year to become an age champion with competition being of such standard. However, the following athletes finally asserted their superiority to emerge as age champions for 1979.

The House competition for 1979 saw Victory emerge as house champions with 1558 points, followed by Sirius with 950 points, Endeavour 917 points and Argo 818 points.

Six weeks after the school carnival came the Westlakes Zone Carnival. Formal team training was conducted at 8.00 a.m. By the time the Zone Carnival arrived we had the strongest athletics team ever to represent the school. However, this was not good enough this year as Morisset High showed their all round superiority to become Zone Champions with Toronto in 2nd place. The team was unfortunate as in most other years they would have been good enough to emerge as Zone champions.

Although no Toronto athletes were Zone age champions, we did have 5 athletes who set new Zone records — Campbell Wood (12 yrs. 800m.), lan Findley (13 yrs. 1500m.), Mark Jones (13 yrs. 80m. hurdles), Dayne Grimmond (15 yrs. 90m. hurdles) and Ross Porter (16 yrs. jump).

From the Zone Carnival Toronto had athletes selected to represent Westlakes at the Hunter Regional Athletes Championships. At these championships the Toronto athletes showed how good they were by gaining 4th place out of 45 competing schools, with Toronto athletes gaining 12 individual 1st places. Two athletes also set records at the championships, Campbell Wood in the 12 years 1500m. with a time of 4

mins. 53 secs. and Ross Porter in the 16 yrs. high jump with a leap of 1.92m. — only 0.02m. off the C.H.S. record. Ross also showed his versatility by becoming 16 yrs. Regional athletics champion.

From the Regional Championships 5 athletes were selected to represent the Hunter Region at the State Championships — Ross Porter, Martin Hand, Mark Jones, Campbell Wood and Julie Steele. At the time of writing this report the State championships are still to be held. However, all these athletes have an excellent chance of gaining a place in their respective events.

Although 1979 has been an excellent year for Toronto High in track and field athletics the school has the potential to do even better. Toronto has the ability to be Regional Champions in 1980. All that is required is the strengthening in 2 important areas.

Firstly, training. Athletes must train if they wish to do well. All the athletes who gained places at the Regional Athletics Championships were regular attenders at the school's 8.00 a.m. training sessions. Many athletes did not perform to their full potential simply because they lacked fitness.

Secondly, a strengthening of the girls' athletics squad. For years Toronto's girls' athletics team were one of the strongest in the region. However, 1979 saw many good athletes not competing or not putting in the necessary training to perform to their maximum potential. The athletic potential definitely exists amongst the girls at Toronto. All that is required is more effort and dedication.

From the Zone Carnival 20 Toronto runners were selected to represent the Westlakes Zone at the Regional Championships which were held


at Muswellbrook.

This thing is slender like the shaft of a rake, This thing is a reptile, known as a snake.




