FROM THE PRINCIPAL ...

It gives me considerable satisfaction to present this Principal's Message for Log Book, 1980.

My satisfaction arises from the opportunity I have been given to be associated with such a fine school as Toronto High. I continue to be impressed by the many achievements of its students in the academic and sporting fields and by the social and cultural opportunities it offers them. It has traditions which have been built under the guidance and leadership of its former Principals, and I would like to acknowledge here the contribution to the school of my predecessor, Mr. Ken Harrap, and express my appreciation of his continued assistance to me in settling into the school. I wish also to acknowledge the dedication and sincerity of the staff, who work so willingly for the benefit of the students of the school.

There are other aspects of the school which continue to impress. One is the very good example set by the senior school, a fine body of young men and women with whom it has been a pleasure to work. Another is the very high level of participation by the students during the year, particularly in the sporting and cultural spheres. The spirit of cheerfulness and co-operation is also evident, as is an increasing willingness to


recognise and applaud the achievement of others. It is these kinds of attitudes which lead to the development of a school spirit, and to a satisfaction in knowing that one belongs to a good school.



EXCHANGE

From Ian Pedlev:

Hello! How is everyone back home at Toronto High? It's impossible to describe and would probably take about half a pad to put it in writing but I'm absolutely having the best time in my life. It is a tremendous experience.

I am currently half-way through my 12 month stay in Saseko, Japan. I am here with four girls, being hosted by the six Lions Clubs of the city of Saseko, which works out to about one club

hosting one student for the year.

Lions Exchange differs somewhat from Rotary, basically because Saseko is the only place in Japan and the world which hosts the year-long exchanges. From past years they have only had girls come to Saseko and they have attended an all-girl Catholic School but with me being the first boy it was decided I should attend a Commercial High School quite some distance from both the girls' school and my home.

The Japanese school system is based upon the American system with junior and senior high schools. I am in the senior year in which there are some 360 students so you can imagine the simplicity of remembering the majority of students' names especially when they are Japanese names I haven't heard before.

My school is enormous in terms of facilities available to the students. Apart from the two main buildings for classes and offices (four storeys' high) there is a gymnasium catering for two "full sized" basketball courts and stage and another smaller one, soccer field, a baseball and softball field, four tennis courts and a handball

In the original design a pool was considered but we got the second gymnasium. However, the school has a population of 1080 students (for 3 years 80% girls - fantastic!)

When I first arrived here I had just left Australian temperatures of 40°C and arrived in -4°C snowing weather. But from about 4 weeks ago it has been what's termed the "tsugu" (rainy season) and believe me, there hasn't been much time since then when it hasn't been absolutely

Unfortunately it is supposed to continue for at least another couple of weeks then it takes another complete change to days that aren't very hot (30°C) but the humidity (80%) is what

Saseko is a beautiful city and is similar in function to Newcastle, being an industrial port with ship-building as its main activity. It is also a naval port, with a population of 250,000.

The presence of a blind Exchange student prompted the local branch of the national T.V. station to feature a "Special" on the school and ever since we have all been well-known foreigners, being seen frequently in the papers and national and local T.V. at various events.

One such event was when a northern agricultural school, about 10 times bigger than Toronto High, invited us to participate in the rice-planting which brought back fond memories of my Geography lessons. (In no way was I

homesick, though!)

During the coming 6 weeks' summer holidays I'll be taken on a 2 week sightseeing tour of Tokyo, the famous Mt Fuji area and the Japanese Alps. Later on in the holidays I'll be also taken on another sightseeing tour of a week-long duration around my own island Kyushu, including the hot springs' area and the Mount Aso area, the site of the largest volcanic crater in the world. (It's no longer active!)

From Eri Umeki

Dear Everybody,

My name is Eri Umeki and I am eighteen years old. I am a Japanese Exchange student. I came to Australia on 30th March and I came to Toronto

High on 9th April.

ends at 3 o'clock.

I will now tell you about my city and school in Japan. I live in Tsuruoka, a city in Yamagata Prefecture, which is in the north — western part of Japan. I do not think that it is particularly easy to find the place on a map. Because the population of the city is about 100,000, it is not a very big city. My city faces the Japan Sea. Our winters are very cold and I do not like them nearly as much as our summers. We always have lots of snow and it lasts for a long time (usually four months). Spring in Japan is beautiful because there are pink cherry blossoms everywhere. Summer is very hot and almost everyone from my city goes to Shornai beach.

My school is Tsuruoka North Senior High School. There are about 800 pupils at my school and we are divided into 18 classes. My class has about 45 pupils. We have five and a half days of school a week and school starts at 8.30 am. We have a half a day of school on Saturday and go home at lunch time on Saturdays. We have ten minutes of recess between each lesson. A lesson lasts for 50 minutes and there are six periods a day. Lunchtime lasts for half an hour and school

After school we have many different clubs. Sports clubs include volleyball, basketball, tennis, table tennis, softball, fencing and climbing. Our culture clubs include Drama, Tea Ceremony, Literature, Newspaper and Choir.

My school uniform is a dark blue sailor blouse and a skirt of the same colour as the blouse. We have to wear our school emblem on our

pockets.

I like Australian foods a great deal but I can't eat vegemite, beetroot, sweet corn and rice pudding. When I go back to Japan I will take some vegemite with me and I will let my family and friends taste vegemite. I think that none of them will like it.

As you probably already know, Japan is a group of small islands. The population of Tokyo is about he same as the population of Australia. There are many people living on the small islands in my country. I really envy you Australians because your country is so large in size

I return to Japan next March, which means that I have eight months of my life left in Australia. When I return to Japan I will still have one more year of school to complete my education because I am in third year.

If you want to know something about Japan, please ask me – slowly. I'm ready to talk to you.

Letter from Debbie Goodsir

I have been in Sweden for just over 5 months now and am enjoying it immensely. I now have 2½ months school holiday, during which I have already been to Oland — an island off south-east Sweden — and to Norrland or Lappland, where I saw the midnight sun. Both experiences were great. In the remainder of the time I will be going to England and then will tour Scandinavia for three weeks before going back to school in the "autumn term".

I live at Massvik, a dairy farm just north of Saffle on Lake Vanern. The Swedish countryside is extremely lovely, with many open pastures, small lakes and rolling, forest-covered hills. Living in the country has enabled me to experience the full impact of both spring and summer.

I have also been able, during winter, to attempt both cross-country and slalom skiing. They're both great fun and, though I have not perfected either, I hope to try again next winter.

I attend the local "gymnasieskolan", that is, the last three years of school. Each community has a school, which is controlled and financed by the communal unit of government. Each student is supplied with both text books and writing materials and lunch is supplied every day by the school, this being a cooked meal.

My school has, as well as ordinary classrooms, a science block, music block and technical block, a library, cafeteria, ten-pin bowling alley, 2 gymnasiums (one being an indoor soccer field with mini grandstand), a theatre and outdoor sporting facilities, which are in winter converted to an ice hockey rink.

No direct payment is made to the school but the community is taxed directly according to the costs of the school. No uniform is worn in school and no classes are taught which contain over 30 pupils. The teachers are all called by their first names — including the Principal.

Also during my stay here I have travelled to England and Wales with my host parents and to the Swedish Alps, skiing with a group of Rotary Exchange students.

All in all, it's been a great year so far and I look forward to the next 6½ months with anticipation.

Hello Everybody – or as we say in Finnish

To write and tell of the highlights of my time is very difficult because every day - to me - is in

its own way special!

After leaving Sydney airport on January, 19th (temperature 40°C) and arriving after a 43 hour flight at Helsinki airport, I discovered a fairyland of snow which was a real culture shock. However, the greatest shock was to walk outside to a temperature of -40°C.

I attended winter courses at Helsinki University in Finnish (for foreigners) and had as may first family non-English speaking people. This encouraged me to try to speak Finnish to survive.

My school is called "Makelinrinteen Yhteiskoulu". It is a sportschool with only 500 students. As subjects I take Finnish, German, Biology, English, Cross-Country Skiing, Volleyball, Mathematics, Swedish and Music. Normally students take 15 subjects at a time and change every six weeks. It was quite confusing for me at first - but - with a little help I worked things out. Also I took on English Club after school and its main aim was to teach about Australia, for Finns don't know more than "Kangaroos and Deserts" in the main. However, what do Australians know of Finland?

Finland is a land of lakes - 60,000 all told. My city where I live, Helsinki, the capital looks out on water and forest on almost every side. It has a population of 500,000 with a skyline dominated by Lutheran and Orthodox cathedrals. Finland is truly a geographical paradise. A common quote used to typify the beauty of Finland is:

"Four Seasons Four Reasons for Finland" Summer days are sunny, warm and immensely

long. The famous Midnight Sun is truly an experience never to forget. It is so light you can read a book in "broad daylight" at 3 a.m. Autumn is a brief but a continual rainy period. Winter is cold but tempered by the Gulf Stream. It is a dry, exhilarating cold with sunshine, ideal for cross-country skiing.

As far as having the opportunity to travel, we 96 students here in Finland (consisting of seven Australians, one New Zealander and the rest being Americans and Canadians) travelled to Leningrad for four days in April. We saw many museums and discovered much of its culture and history. However, the atmosphere despair in the common people was felt.

In May, I travelled to central-north Finland for the ski holiday. After recovering from my first attempt at slalom (when I hit a telegraph pole) I found it a really good sport - as long as you watch where you're going! I've also had the opportunity to travel for one month in Europe and visited Sweden, Denmark, North Germany, Bavaria, Austria, Paris (for one day) and England.

I think one of the most special times for me was from the 26th July till 8th August when I was a helper in a camp for handicapped people. The people came from Finalnd, Iceland, Norway, Germany, Austria, Switzerland, France and England. The camp was set on the shores of a lake amidst Finland's beautiful woodland.

We went swimming, sailing, salmon fishing, attended pottery, ceramic and photography classes and dances. The members of the camp were also introduced to Finnish culture and what

could be more typical than SAUNA!

I really am going to miss a traditional smoke sauna set on the shores of a lake. The sauna is heated to about 110°C and after a while you hit yourself all over with a bunch of birch branches which are dipped into warm water called "Vasta", which is extremely good for the circulation. Then you jump into the lake. The coldest water I have jumped into was 6°C and it was a tremendous feeling. When the snow comes and stays and stays it's a beautiful feeling to run from sauna and roll in the snow.

Summer in Finland is in dramatic contrast to winter and is usually a wet period. This year the rainfall has been very low and sunshine and warmth very prominent. We had a heatwave for two weeks, with temperatures averaging 30°C. I was as unprepared as the Finns were. We Aussies have the solution - "we brought the

sunshine".

My Finnish has ben interrupted by my change to a Swedish-speaking family. 6 per cent of Finland's 4.5 million people speak Swedish as their mother-tongue. I am appreciating the difference between a Finnish and Swedish lifestyle.

In short, Youth Exchange is a year full of experiences, contributing to the growth of you as a

person.

I wish to thank Toronto Rotary and wish those doing the H.S.C. all the possible best. Hello to all new pupils and members of staff and regards to your new Principal. I wish you all a safe and happy Christmas and New Year.

HISTORY DEPARTMENT 1979-80

The awareness of the importance and interesting nature of the study of history received a considerable boost in the last few months of 1979 when the whole school became involved in the celebration of the Sesqui-centenary of the Toronto Community. It was exciting and most rewarding to have the whole school so completely involved in making contributions to the celebrations and there is no doubt that the reputation of our school and the awareness of the talents of our students has grown significantly in the eyes of the community.

Following on from the work of the Sesquicentenary, we set ourselves to enjoy a fairly quiet year in 1980 but that was not to be. A major revision of the work in Years 7 and 8 has also had effects on the history taught in Years 9 and 10. Now, for the first time, students in Years 7 and 8 can experience something of each of the social science disciplines before they have to elect for more intensive study in Years 9 and 10. The course in Year 8 introduces students to topics on Early Man and Early Civilizations and, at the same time, some of the skills of working with evidence to reconstruct the past, are introduced.

The changes in course-work organised for the Junior school have been reinforced by the introduction of a new syllabus for Years 7-10 to become operative in 1981. Under this syllabus, students are required to study 5 terms of Australian history in Years 9 and 10 and in addition, the new approaches to teaching, using a variety of resources from which students reconstruct the historical past, are emphasised.

Clearly, under the new syllabus, history is seen as the subject by which students are made aware of their own cultural heritage, they come to understand the nature of the modern world and they acquire skills in the objective analysis of evidence.


Not that the study of history is always necessarily such a serious matter. During the year a number of useful, though less serious events have been held which have stimulated interest and enjoyment. A number of classes have been involved in making models and painting historical murals. An event we anticipate with considerable interest is the presentation, in late November, of a special exhibition of the weapons of the Ancient Romans, Greeks, Persians and the Middle Ages. The group of Sydney-based specialists will also be demonstrating some of the techniques of ancient warfare and we hope to increase the level of historical experience by having a medieval banquet and having students dress in period costume.

In the Senior School we have taken advantage of the range of options available in Modern History, to present two one-year courses on topics calculated to be of major interest to our students. In Year 11 we have studied a course dealing with the background and outcomes of some of the major Revolutions of World History. In Year 12 our work has concentrated on attempting to understand the upheavals of world history between 1914 to 1945 and beyond.

Our work in Ancient History is still based largely on the study of Ancient Greek and Roman civilizations although some time is also spent on Ancient Egypt. This year we were fortunate to have the services of a lecturer from Newcastle University who visited the Year 12 class on two occasions to speak on topics on the Roman period. Our students certainly appreciated his efforts on our behalf and with just a moderate bit of good luck, their deeper understanding of the work will be refected in the final examination this year.



LIBRARY REPORT, 1980.

How quickly the year goes! It seems no time at all since I was writing the Library report for 1979. The last twelve months have been full of many varied and interesting activites associated with

the Library.

The Library collection continues to grow and diversify and the problems of space and storage are now acute; perhaps we'll have to think about suspending bookshelves from the ceiling. We'll have to consider a slight reducation in seating accommodation to allow floor space for additional shelving. At Stocktaking 1979, the Library collection consisted of 14,267 items; over \$1,200 was spent during 1979 on audio-visual items, i.e. kits, slides filmstrips etc; a total of \$5,610 was spent on additions to the Library collection - including audio-visual. Since the beginning of 1980, 1,065 items have been added to the collection.

Such a development of the Library collection would not be possible without the willing assistance of the Clerical Assistants. I would like to give my special thanks to Mrs. Beryl Fenwick, Mrs. Joan Wright and Mrs. Annette Godsk. Mrs. Fenwick is present in the Library from 8.00 a.m. to 3.45 p.m. every day; her duties are many and varied and I thank her for her co-operation. Her duties include processing fiction, - books, and processing video cassettes, keeping financial records and assistance with the Library supervision. Mrs. Wright comes in on Monday and Wednesday and is responsible for cataloguing all the non-fiction and audio-visual items. Mrs. Godsk comes in on Friday and is responsible for the processing of all audio cassettes; at least ten programmes are taped from special A.B.C School broadcasts each week; the collection of audio cassettes in now being used more by students as there are taped stories and musical programmes which are of interest to them.

The Library could not function properly without the help of the Library prefects, who, on a roster basis, help with covering and mending books, returning books to the shelves and generally seeing that the Library is kept reasonably tidy. Early in June we held a morning tea in the Library for the Prefects and those parents who could come. Mr. D. Foster presented the Prefects with their badges. Special thanks to the Senior Library Prefects, Greg Elfinck and Sharon Visocchi - Year 10 and Irene Bergquist and Karen Bougthon - Year 9. It is pleasing to see some of last year's new Prefects carrying on with their duties - Margaret Gill, Greg Hebert and Avril Unwin - Year 8. A number of the Year 7 students have become Library Prefect and I'm pleased to see a number of the boys who are prepared to give up some of their time to help in the Library - Helen Hill, Lisa Visocchi, Nicole Fletcher, Michael Hamilton, Jason Maxwell, Glen Holmes, Wayne Humphries, Hank Buchanan, Karen Nazzari, Lee Johns, Darren Cowell and lanelle Trotter.

The outstanding event in the Library this year was certainly Book Week, 1980. Friday, 18th July saw the culmination of a very successful ten days or so of activities at Toronto High School to mark Book Week, 1980. The theme for Book Week this year was 'CARE FOR BOOKS', so a lot of emphasis was placed on the donation of books to the Library by the students. The class collection was organised on the basis of roll classes and fund raising activities ranged through guessing competitions, raffles, cake and toffee stalls; an ice cream eating competition and a general class collection each day. 8B2 raised the magnificent amount of \$51.49 and has donated a twovolume illustrated Oxford Dictionary; other classes to raise substantial amounts were 7.3 -\$36.14; 7.8 - \$26.00; 7.2 - \$22.93; 10.1 - \$20.66; Yr. 11 Girls - \$20.02; 7.4 - \$19.12; 7.5 - \$17.30; 8E - \$12.28; 7.6 - \$12.05; 8C1 - \$10.00. A total of \$343.12 was raised.

Another feature of Book Week was the Grooley Parade, held on Wednesday, 15th July in the Library. Students were asked to design wigs and hair-dos to suit a number of sections i.e. glamorous, groovey, gigantic, granny etc. The Parade attracted a good deal of the interest and spectators and entrants alike enjoyed themselves. The P. and C. Association generously donated a book prize of \$5.00 for the winner in each section and the winners were: Paddy Fox 7.8; Margaret Gill 8A1; Wayne Humphries 7.8; Lisa Visocchi 7.4; Darren McDonald 8A2; Michael Hamilton 7.8; Karen Nazarri 7.6; Duncan

Buckley 7.8; Karen Henderson 7.8

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During the week students displayed particular interest in a Book Display; of special importance were the number of books in the Oldest Book section; other section were for the largest, the smallest, the most unusual, a book in another language and a picture book. Again the P. & C. Assocation donated a book prize of \$5.00 for winners in each section: - Oldest Book 1779 - Bruce White 10.8; Largest Book - a family Bible - Michael Judd 8A1; smallest book - Maryanne McGrath 9.4 and Tony Clark 8A1 - equal - most unusual book - a combination scrap book and ledger - Chris Thornton 9.8; book in another

language - [Dutch] Kristy Smith 7.5; Picture Book -

Michelle Edwards 8C2; A Special prize for most unusual display was awarded to Bruce White 10.8.

Special attention was drawn, during the week, to the display of books that had won awards for Book of the Year and Picture Book of the Year; a number of picture books on display proved popular.

At the end of a busy and exhausting fortnight, the Library Staff felt that Book Week, 1980 was very interesting and worthwhile. Many thanks to the students and staff who worked so hard to ensure that it was a success.

During Education Week, and Open Day in particular, the Library was open to parents who, on this occasion, were able to look at the books donated during Book Week and several parents were so impressed by the effort that the students had made that they donated books as well. Further donations to the Library were made to commemorate Anzac Day, 1980.

A feature of Library activities has been paperback book sales, poster sales and second hand sales - all activities help to foster and stimulate interest in the Library.

Borrowing figures remain at a steady high level, averaging 400 items per week and the Library is usually used, both rooms, most periods of the day; seats are fully occupied at recess and lunchtime as students do assignments - research or interesting reading.

Planned activities for the remainder of 1980 included Australian Library Week and Stamp Week in September and Australian Book Week in October. We also plan to hold special displays of the handicrafts, models, paintings, etc.

We appreciate the support of the canteen Committee for the School Library, also the support and interest displayed by the Parents and Citizens Association who held their monthly meetings in the Library. But especially the Library Staff value the support and interest of all Staff and Students at Toronto High School and we hope you will all continue to find the Library a friendly and pleasant place to come to work and relax.





ATHLETICS REPORT

The past twelve months has again seen a steady improvement in performance by Toronto athletes. Last year (1979) saw the best athletics results ever achieved by Toronto High to that date, culminating in 4th place being gained at the Regional Championships. However, the results achieved by Toronto athletes in 1980 were markedly better than the results of 1979.

Highlights of the year were undoubtedly the third placing, out of almost 50 competing schools, at the Regional Championships. (Toronto High gained 390 points, over 100 points ahead of the 4th placed school. This was a big improvement on last year's performance where Toronto gained 229 points for 4th place). We gained 17 Regional representatives to compete at the C.H.S. Championships. Those representatives were: **Girls** — A. Sneddon, C. Lewis, C. Tobin, J. Field, J. McGregor, A. Graham, S. Smith and A. Cunliffe. **Boys** — M. Jones, C. Turvey, R. Smee, P. Anderson, S. O'Reilly, B. Williams, R. Porter, B. Simmonds and S. Croft.

Normally, students who gain a place at the Regional Championships would gain a mention in the annual Athletics Report. Unfortunately the large number of placegetters precludes that from being done this year. However, students who set new Regional records deserve special mention. Rodney Naylor, competing in the 12 years Javelin set a new record of 30.7 metres. Julie McGregor set a new record in the 16 years' girls 200 metres with a time of 26.7 secs; Ross Porter jumped 1.92 metres to set a new record in the Open High Jump and Craig Turvey, Robert Smee, Phillip Anderson and Steven O'Reilly combined to set a new record in the 16 years' relay with a time of 46.3 seconds.

Leading up to the Regional Athletics Carnival, Toronto High's athletes competed in the School Carnival and the Zone Carnival, with first-rate performances being achieved in each.

The school's annual Athletics Carnival again saw Victory house win for the third year in succession. Also at the Carnival 25 new records were set.

Leading up to the Zone Carnival, it was obvious that Toronto had its best Athletics team in the history of the school, with most team members having trained for six weeks prior to the Carnival.

However, was the team good enough to beat last year's Regional Champions, Morisset? After the first day's competition, Toronto was leading narrowly from Morisset, with the other schools well behind.

On the second day Morisset started to show its athletic depth of talent and slowly started to draw away from Toronto. By the end of the day Morisset had gained first place with Toronto second.

Analysis of the final points showed where Morisset gained most of their points. In the boys' events Morisset and Toronto were virtually even. However in the girls' events Morisset were well ahead of Toronto, even though the Toronto girls were second in the Zone pointscore overall.

If Toronto is to beat Morisset next year and be Zone and Regional Champions, we will have to improve in the girls' events. The talent exists. What is required is more application to the sport.

At the Zone Championships two athletes performed exceedingly well and deserve congratulations for being Zone Age Champions for 1980. They were Rodney Naylor in the 12 years' boys and Jenny Field in the 15 years' girls.

Let us hope that 1981 sees a continuation of the improvement in athletics over the last two years. Maybe 1981 will see Toronto High emerge Regional Champions. The talent exists. All that is required is greater dedication to training.

CROSS COUNTRY REPORT


1980 saw Toronto High regain the Zone Cross Country title which it won in 1978. This year's team was even stronger than the team which won the school's first Cross Country title in 1978. The performance of the runners both at Zone and Regional level was such that it would be fair to say that Toronto High was the top Cross Country school in the Hunter Region for 1980.

It became obvious after the first few races at the Zone Cross Country Championship that the Zone title was going to be a battle between Toronto High and last year's champions, Wall-

send High, with the other schools being well out of the running. Fortunately the weeks of regular racing and training paid dividends for the school, to see Toronto win by 813 points to Wallsend's 917 points with third placed school, West Wallsend, well back on 1,162 points.

The win this year can be attributed to two main reasons. Firstly, a supreme team effort with all runners giving of their best and secondly a tremendous improvement by the girls who were clearly superior to their Wallsend opponents.

The overall strength of the Toronto team can be seen by the fact that 34 runners were selected to represent the Westlakes Zone at the Regional Championships.



Best individual results were achieved by Donna Towers (16 yrs.) and Maree Simon (13 yrs.) who were age champions, Julie Henderson (12 yrs.), Paul Conway (12 yrs.), Jon Drayton (13 yrs.), Benny Harman (16 yrs.) and Michael Smith (opens) who gained 2nd places and Rodney Naylor (12 yrs.), Rodney Rendall (13 yrs.), Ian Findley (14 yrs.) and Linda Tait (opens) who gained 3rd places.

At the Regional Cross Country Championship, Toronto's runners played a major part in the Westlakes Zone winning their 2nd successive ti-

tle.

With seven zones and 50 schools competing, this was an excellent effort. From these Championships, five runners were selected in the Regional team to contest the C.H.S. Championships. They were Matthew Pryor (12 yrs.), David McDonald (14 yrs.), Benny Harman (15 yrs.), Julie Henderson (12 yrs.) and Donna Towers (16 yrs.). Special mention should also be given to Donna Towers who managed to gain a double by winning both the Zone and Regional titles.


