




Particularly pleasing is the increasing readiness of students to recognise and applaud the efforts and achievements of other members of the school community.







1st Place - Year 10 - Black and White Minstrels - Kim Van Koeverden, Louise Filmer, Learne Taylor, Lisa Nielson.


2nd Place - Joanne Devine - Year 9. 3rd Place - Michelle Offen - Year 9.


As in past years, a busload of German students from various classes will again go on an excursion to the traditional Oktoberfest at the Germania Club.



Howdy,

Tammie Anderson from Sulphur, Oklahoma and being a Rotary Exchange student in Australia, especially Toronto, is one of the greatest experiences a person could ask for. The cultures are so different, yet I feel as if Toronto has been my home for years. It took me no time at all to settle in because everybody was really nice and helped me in every way possible.

Coming from a small, inland Oklahoman town to a large waterfront city, was quite a shock. I love living right on the waterfront of Lake Macquarie and being so close to the ocean. Living over here has given me the opportunity to take advantage of all the good weather and outdoor sports. I especially enjoy going to the

Sulphur is a small town with 8000 people in south-central Oklahoma. It was named after the Sulphur Springs in the Chickasaw National Recreation Area which is the only national park in Oklahoma. The part attracts many visitors during the summer months, who come there to camp and swim in the mineral springs. Apart from tourism, the town services farms, ranches and oil wells in the community.

I have found some differences between Australian and American schools. In Sulphur. students usually begin school when they are five years old. They attend grade school for five years then go to a middle school for four years. After middle school they attend high school with an enrolment of approximately 450 students for four years.

High school offers a wide range of subjects for a student to choose from. In order to graduate, a student must complete 20 units, consisting of four units of English, one each of Science, Maths, Oklahoma and American History and the rest of the units can be made up from elective subjects like Shorthand, Accounting, Home Science, Journalism, Typing, Vocational Agricultural, Art, Music or Spanish.

Students from different years may be in the same elective class as in your Universities. The school also organises all the sporting activities in the town and furnishes all the equipment, facilities and uniforms.

I am thoroughly enjoying my stay here in Toronto and would like to thank all the students and teachers for welcoming me to Toronto High school.

**Tammie** 

My name is Laureen O'Hanlon and I'm an A.F.S. (American Field Service) American Exchange Student. I come from San Juan Capistrano, California, which is on the southern coast about 300kms. south of Los Angeles. It is a rapidly growing city of about 20,000 people. The climate is very similar to here with lots of sunshine, very little rain and far less of the notorious smog than the other parts of inland California.

Capistrano is known as one of California's historical towns with the oldest of the many Californian Spanish missions as the main feature of the downtown area. The town and the mission are also famous because of the legend about the swallows' annual return on March 19th. Central Capistrano is about two miles inland from the ocean and some of California's most favourable beach areas, including a large marina at Dana Point (named after Richard Henry Dana, author of "Two Years Before The Mast" in which the area was mentioned).

All these elements combine to make this area somewhat tourist oriented and indeed, there is more than an average amount of entertainment-type activity nearby, even allowing that this part of the country is a kind of huge

playground.

My High school is in Dana Point and it is a four year school from years 9-12, called Dana Hills High school. It's a large school with tennis courts, baseball fields, softball fields, swimming pool, gymnasium (multi-purpose centre) and a recently-built football stadium. Most high schools in America are equally well-equipped and in most towns these are the community facilities also.

School in the states differs greatly from Australian school systems. First, and most importantly in my opinion, we have no H.S.C. Junior High School (or intermediate school) comprises years 7/8 and students go there after leaving their six year elementary schools (kindergarten-

High school is usually Year 9 to Year 12, 6th class). although some towns start in Year 10, and in finishing there, you obtain a High school diploma if you have completed the required classes in

There is still the opportunity to drop out after the age of 16 but there is really little need, considering it isn't difficult to complete the minimum graduation requirements. It begins to get difficult when you look into the University requirements - to be accepted into the University of California for instance. There's an entire additional list of required classes that must be taken either before graduation or after graduation at a Junior College (or Intermediate College). All in all, the students have a wide choice of subjects and it is their decision about what they will take in accordance with the required classes.

Lots of kids take the minimum number of required classes and fill their schedules with "Mickey Mouse" courses e.g. Drama, Typing, Photography, School Newspaper Staff). Some of these classes do provide opportunities to learn skills beyond the basic academic fields but, to the extent that some kids use them, they can be

taken just for easy marks. I believe that both systems (Australian and American) have their good and bad points. The

Australian school system has been good for me because I've been taught to study in a more serious way but if I had to take the H.S.C. I might

think differently.

When I return home in January, I have six months more of school and then I graduate. My school year here has been very rewarding so far, not only in learning but every new experience and friend has added to this great year I've had in Australia. I wanna thank Toronto High for providing me with all these things and opening up their doors to show me a year I will never forget.

Some special ones that come to mind are Australian Library Week in September, when the Library is usually bedecked with streamers and balloons and special posters. Stamp Week is also very popular in September; in October we concentrate on books on an Australian Theme to mark Australian Book Week; Earth Week, Horses' Birthday, National Aborigines Week are others that

As in other years, the Library has been the setting for Inter-School debates; for meetings between parents and teachers; for monthly meetings of the P. & C. Association; for welcoming many parents during Education Week, particularly on Open Day. We were also pleased to welcome, towards the end of the year, the Year 6 classes from the feeder primary schools who became our Year 7 for 1981. It is important that the Library should be regarded as a meeting place for students, staff and parents; a Library is more than just a place where books are kept.

An innovation in the Library for 1981 was the introduction of reading lists. Library staff has spent a considerable amount of time in preparing reading lists on dozens of different themes;

these lists have been prepared in booklet form and are being issued to students on request. From time to time special displays of books have been prepared on particular themes. A marked increase in the number of fiction books borrowed has been noticed since the introduction of

these reading lists.

The Library collection continues to grow and diversify and the problems of space and storage are now acute. New shelving was ordered at the beginning of this year and has been arriving in bits and pieces. New shelving will be placed in the Senior Study Centre so that all the books in the 800 and 900 sections will be housed there. All audio-visual material has been moved into the A.V. Room. Problems of storage and display of periodicals still remain to be solved.

Early in the year, the P. & C. Association received a letter from Mr. Landa, Minister for Education, indicating that approval had been given for the building of a new Library; we are still waiting hopefully for the first sod to be turn-


ed.

At stocktaking, 1981, the Library collection consisted of 15,198 items; special emphasis in 1981 has been placed on building up the reference collection. The P. &C. Association bought the 1980 edition of the World Book Encyclopaedia as a contribution to this effort. Since the beginning of 1981, 909 items have been added. The Library budget has to cover a wide variety of items, for not just books make up the Library. Collection money is spent on audiovisual items e.g. kits, slides, cassettes etc., periodicals and newspapers, the pamphlet file, stationery e.g. cards of different types, plastic and contact, magazine holders. During the year, approximately \$6,000 is spent on the Library at Toronto High School; this is approx. \$6.00 per student. A growing problem for the Library is the rapidly increasing cost of books; paperbacks are now \$3.95 to \$6.95 and hardbacks are between \$6.00 and \$25.00 per book. Considerable savings have been made this year, by joining the Book Club Associates, where books are purchased each month at considerable savings. I would like, here, to express my appreciation of the interest in and support for the Library shown by the Canteen Committee and by the P. & C. Association.

The activities in the Library and the growth of the collection would not be possible without the help and support of the Library staff. Special thanks to Mrs. Beryl Fenwick, Mrs. Joan Wright and Mrs. Annette Godsk who tackle a wide variety of tasks cheerfully and efficiently. This year I have been most impressed with the help and assistance given by the Library Prefects, Rodney Harris, Greg Sexton, and Margaret Gill — Year 9; Karen Nazzari and Glen Holmes — Year 8; Vanessa Smith and Jenny Woolsey — Year 7. The tasks done by the Library Prefects often go unnoticed, but without them the Library could not function very effectively.

As in other years the Library is always busy, being well used by students and staff at all times. The Library Staff look forward to another year in which we can all work together to make the Library at Toronto High School a pleasant and friendly place for both work and relaxation.



#### **Animals**


