I come from Kenya and live in the capital city, Nairobi. I attended Central Nairobi Secondary School before becoming an A.F.S. student. All schools in Nairobi start at 8.00 a.m. but don't all finish at the same time. In my school we finished at 4.10 p.m. I studied: Maths, English Language, Physics, Chemistry, Biology, Commerce, Religious Education, Geography, History and Drama. In my school one had to study at least nine subjects or more. We participated in many activities, sports, music competitions and stage drame in many different schools. I was quite good at acting and won a trophy for best actress in a play. We are not allowed to choose our own sports, we have to do the sport set by the school. Apart from English language, Swahili, which is the National Language in Kenya, is compulsory in all schools. Respect to teachers is very important and we should stand for the

teacher once he/she arrives. My school was considered a secondary school because it catered for only four years of Education before attaining the exam K.C.E. (Kenya Certificate of Education). After passing that exam one could proceed to Higher School to study at least 3 subjects for a career. In my case I wanted to become a lawyer so I had to do Economics, C.R.W. and History. Assembly was to be attended everyday. We are not allowed to speak our native languages, English must be spoken at all times otherwise it may lead to punishment. Classes are much larger than yours and can have up to 40 in a single class. The school comprised about a thousand pupils, making it very large for a secondary school.



N.Z. Rotary Twin Match Exchange 1984

This exchange scheme is run annually between Australia and New Zealand. The twin match is a short term exchange lasting three months. An Australian student and a New Zealander are paired through similar interests, then the "Kiwi" spends the first school term with his Australian family, and in second term the roles are reversed.

Gavin Smith, my twin, lived with my family from January to early May. He enjoyed his stay here and expressed a great willingness to return.

On May 12th I left Toronto for Stokes Valley, New Zealand. Stokes Valley is a suburb of Wellington and a part of the industrial Hutt Valley. The first thing which struck me about my new home was that it was surrounded by large hills.

During my 105 days in New Zealand, I attended Taita College which was quite different from Toronto High. Taita has some 800 pupils making it about the same size as Toronto considering it did not have year 7 students. I learnt very quickly at Taita College. Firstly I discovered that Rugby (Union) is the Number 1 game and some knowledge about it is a necessity. The school's first fifteen is sponsored by local businesses and is supplied with new uniforms every month. Secondly one must be careful what idioms you use to avoid embarrassing situations. The language can be quite different.

The highlight of my stay would probably be skiing Mt. Ruapehu. It was unfortunate the snow didn't really come this year — one of the slopes was applying for drought relief but I didn't really mind. My first ski trip was with my class. There were 18 of us and I was the only male. We had a great time and I can't think of a better way to get wet, cold, bruised and still have fun (that was only the skiing).

The best part of any Exchange is where Exchange students get together. As a group all of the twin matches visited a Maori marae. The marae is a meeting house which doubles for a big lounge room. We were taught about Maori customs and culture which was really interesting.

If there is anyone reading this thinking about an exchange I suggest you go for it. You will have a great time. I wanted to sign up for next year.

I'm sure nobody has ever heard of my town, Lyckeby; but Karlskrona, of which Lyckeby is a suburb is rather well known. It is famous for it's "Soviet Submarines"

My school has about two thousand pupils between the ages of sixteen and twenty. The school, Karlskrona Chapman Skolan, is one hundred and one years old and the buildings in which it is housed are well over the two hundred year mark. There is a wide array of subjects offered. For my first term, which was the last of the terms that make up the Swedish school year, I have Gym,

English, Swedish language and Swedish, which is a parallel to our English course. The summer vacation extends for ten weeks which is now almost finished. There is little or not discipline in school in Sweden and the physical punishment of children is illegal. Many will say, "Now that is a good idea", but if you could see the way that the Swedish youth is now heading you would very quickly change your minds.

Now onto a brighter topic. Ten weeks is a long holiday and I have made good use of the time. The first of my many trips was to France for a week of snow skiing. This was a new experience for me and it proved to be quite fun. It also provided entertainment for all watching. The next country I found myself in was England for one week. I spent the whole time in London. This proved to be a lot of fun and rather interesting. Against the advice of all my Swedish friends I made a visit to the Soviet Union. This was by far the most interesting and educational of my trips. The week was spent in Leningrad. It was a real eye opener and I was saddened by the fact that a country of such size and importance in world affairs could appear to be so poor. My final adventure was to spend two weeks with Olli Laurila in Finland. For those of you who really knew Olli, you could guess what happened when we hit town.

Well, time pushes on and so must I. In closing, I will say one thing to all those students planning to become an Exchange Student sometime in the future. The exchange year is not all fun. It includes a lot of hard times and can be the next best thing to impossible, but I can assure you that overall it is worth the effort.





Three students won computers as prizes. They were Derek Taylor, Helene Laura and Katherine Venners.





New video lists have been prepared; a picture and poster collection is being developed. Average weekly borrowing rate is over 400 items per week; the Library rooms are booked for most periods during the week and the Library is always filled to capacity at recess and lunchtime and before school.

THE SCHOOL COUNSELLORS

A School Counsellors' involvement in the school is specifically in the area of pupil welfare. They are people who have been teachers and have opted to undertake additional training and then to return to schools to counsel the students. School Counsellors take no ordinary classes in schools.

Counselling is the process of helping people to understand the choices they have available to them and then to make decisions that are best for them. School Counsellors, by talking to students individually, attempt to help them to make the best use of all their talents, and to find ways around any problem that may be preventing this. Counsellors also aim to help the student who is unhappy for some reason: it my be because of trouble or hassles with friends, parents, teachers, or other students at school; because of nervousness, shyness or any of a hundred other reasons. Counsellors are guided by a rule of confidentiality and this means that they are duty-bound not to repeat information they receive in their interviews with individuals.

Counsellors can also assist school students on a group basis by running training groups in areas such as: Effective study skills and examination techniques, assertive training and confidence building exercises, and relaxation techniques to mention some. An interesting development at Toronto High School in this area was the introduction in 1984 of the Year 11 Camp. The School Counsellors were actively involved in the camp activities and this permitted contact with many students.

At present T.H.S. is serviced by two School Counsellors who between them visit all the Primary Schools in the local area, plus Toronto High, each week. The Counsellors work with students, teachers, parents, plus other professionals in an endeavour to help solve the variety of problems which exist.

The School Counsellors' office is located in Block D, just inside the main door in the middle of the ground floor (under the stairs). Appointments for an interview can be made by:

a) Approaching one of the counsellors at their office yourself;

or,

b) Contacting the school Secretaries to make an appointment.




They also put on a Variety Night which again showed the quality of our musicians.


JUNIOR DEBATING
