Cyber Bullying Incident

May 2016

As most people are aware, we dealt with a cyber-bullying incident that occurred at the end of last term. We suspended a significant number of students as a result of inappropriate conduct. I won't rehash what I wrote in the letter that was published and sent to all families. I will make a few points in this newsletter item:

Thanks to the vast majority of parents who supported the school stance and used this as an opportunity to have a discussion with their child regarding internet/social media use. I know that many families were 'tightening up' internet / social media / phone use procedures at home as a result.

• This wasn't something new that we were doing – we have taken this stance for years. The difference was this time we were provided with lots of information from lots of students. We had approximately 20 students come to the front office on the first morning to make reports about the incident. These students were disgusted in what had occurred. I'm very proud of those students who reported, as it demonstrates the type of character that we wish to develop in all of our students; that is, standing up for what is right, and, looking out for and doing something about people who may be victimised by others.

• We won't catch everyone who is involved, but they will still be learning from this incident and hopefully wont engage in this type of behaviour again.

I would like to thank everybody for the messages of support via our Facebook page and to the school email and my email addresses. There were hundreds..... I havent been able to respond because of the vast number; it would take me months to respond to everyone. If you have written a letter, email or post, please take this as my reply and thanking you for your support.

Learning Enrichment & Acceleration Program (LEAP – formerly CAIL)

Toronto High School LEAP class is now in its fifth year. It was introduced to add a Gifted and Talented (GAT) stream to the academic offerings at the school. The aim is to provide an alternative learning and accelerated academic education program to families on the western side of Lake Macquarie.

We set high standards for this class and the applications for the 2017 class reflect this standard. This year we have over 50 applications for approximately 20 places. Students have already completed the intake exams, the interview, and, we are currently reviewing their school information and results before making offers. Thanks to all those who have applied, and for those families that miss out, we have great educational opportunities in our mainstream classes. Students in these classes are achieving great results as well!

National Assessment Program

NAPLAN was completed over 10 - 12 May for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 across Australia. The results of these tests will provide useful information for teachers and parents. In particular, they will help to inform teachers in their ongoing efforts to address the literacy and numeracy needs of their students across all subjects.

As well as the ongoing focus on literacy and numeracy, there was a targeted focus with students in Years 7 and 9 in the lead up to the testing.

Parents will receive the results later in the year. I would like to remind parents that these tests are one-off tests and the school uses a range of ongoing assessments to diagnose and support student learning.

I was very fortunate to undertake the Relieving Deputy Principal position while Greg Morgan was abroad. During this time our school experienced a couple of significant challenges and I would like to take this time to extend my warmest sympathy to our families for their loss.

At a time of loss and grief it is warming to have our extended school community for support. If you feel that your child would benefit from additional support at this time, please do not hesitate to contact me. As Head Teacher Student Services I will endeavour to facilitate a service to suit their needs. Grieving is a personal and highly individual experience. How you grieve depends on many factors, including your personality and coping style, your life experience, your faith, and the nature of the loss. The grieving process takes time. Healing happens gradually; it can't be forced or hurried—and there is no "normal" timetable for grieving. Some people start to feel better in weeks or months. For others, the grieving process is measured in years. Whatever your grief experience, it's important to be patient with yourself and allow the process to naturally unfold.

From our Year Advisers -

Year 12 - This time of the year sees Year 12 busily continuing with their studies after just completing their Half Yearly examinations, with the next ones of course being the Trial HSC in Term 3.

Fundraising for the end of year formal is also continuing with the sale of cakes last term, and chocolates this term. The 2016 Year 12 Formal will be held at Merewether Surf House on Wednesday 16 November 2016.

Year 10 - Students have had a challenging return to Term Two. They have come together as a year group and supported each other very well. In the next few weeks they have their Half Yearly exams and will need to start to revise in preparation for those.

We also have the opportunity to be entertained by a visiting theatre group thanks to the efforts of Maddie Smith, our School Student Welfare Officer. Information on the theatre performance will be available shortly.

Year 8 - Congratulations to the Buckley Shield Under 14 Boys Rugby League team who played late last term. The boys, mostly from Year 8, played extremely well, however, they lost their first two matches by close margins. The boys then played Newcastle High School in their final game and defeated them 36-0.

Last Friday the Under 15 Bill Turner Cup Soccer side represented Toronto High School and played extremely well. The team won one game and lost their second. Congratulations to all Year 8 students for their efforts during the first semester.

And also a word on school bullying -

While there is a natural tendency to focus on your child's reading, writing and numeracy skills, a fundamental aspect of school success is your child's physical, mental and social development. Misunderstandings and arguments are pretty common in the playground. Kids are still developing social skills and learning how to

communicate with others. Not every incident or disagreement that upsets a student can be defined as bullying – sometimes it's a one-off problem or a genuine misunderstanding.

Bullying is different. Bullying is a deliberate and repeated abuse of power of one student over another. It can be verbal, physical or psychological abuse that is intended to cause harm.

Lately, there has also been a lot of talk about cyberbullying. This happens through communication technology like email, social networking sites such as MSN, Facebook and of course mobile phones. This kind of harassment can be spread very quickly, not just to a child's own friends, but way beyond the school community to complete strangers. It can be devastating and needs to be taken as seriously as any other form of bullying. Bullying is not a problem isolated to school yards. It can happen anywhere that kids socialise, including online. It's a community issue, which is why parents have such an important role to play in resolving this kind of negative and very damaging behaviour.

Unfortunately, parents often don't hear about their child's problems until the issue has really escalated and their child has been repeatedly harassed and hurt. If your child is not one to talk openly - and many teenagers have trouble expressing themselves in this way - some of the signs that may indicate there is a problem are:

- Sudden physical pain like stomach aches or head aches that keep them from school.
- Finding it difficult to get out of bed or not wanting to go to school at all.
- A change in their demeanour. Are they more withdrawn than usual? Do they look stressed or really miserable?
- Are they much angrier than normal? Is your child having trouble containing his emotions?
- Or perhaps you've noticed a sudden decline in academic performance?

I think the best advice I can give is trust your instincts. You know your child best. If you feel that there's been a change in your child that lasts for more than a week please contact your Year Adviser and have a chat.

This resilience, the ability to bounce back from setbacks or challenges with confidence and optimism, is a vital skill for Year 7 as they progress through high school and enter adulthood. For our Year 10 students, the return to an outdoor program as a leader provided opportunities to master skills or conquer courses that overwhelmed them in their Year 7 experience.

Through the 'outdoor' program all students were given the opportunity to recognise that risk can be dealt with responsibly and with consideration, rather than recklessly. Working collegially teaches students the important skill of working within a team to achieve a certain goal. Delivery in an outdoor setting brings a respect for the natural world and recognition of the part it plays in the lives of all humans.

The rain held off and the sun came out to brighten our day as we conversed the different challenges of:

- Canoeing in 3 person canoes.
- Rock climbing a 5m and 10m rock climbing tower at the centre
- High Ropes Courses a harnessed activity of sequential elements at 4m, 7m and 12m.
- Giant Swing a very exhilarating 15m harnessed pendulum swing
- Dual Flying Fox a harnessed activity an adrenaline rush flying fox down a steep slope.
- Leap of Faith an adrenalin rush, leaping off a 10m pole.
- Challenge Ropes a harnessed activity of sequential elements rising to 8m with 60m flying fox.
- Kayaking in a 2 person sea kayak.

By 5pm we were boarding the buses. Everyone was exhausted and the buses were quiet for the trip back to school.

UN Youth Conference NSW 2016 – Gender Perspectives in Peace & Conflict

Recently we had the privilege of attending the UN Youth State Conference. The conference runs from Friday through till Sunday, and each year an elected convenor selects a topic to focus on, this year's being 'Gender Perspectives in Peace & Conflict". Over 180 NSW students from years 9-12 attended.

Compulsory School Attendance

Information for parents

Education for your child is important and regular attendance at school is essential for your child to achieve their educational best and increase their career and life options. NSW public schools work in partnership with parents to encourage and support regular attendance of children and young people. When your child attends school every day, learning becomes easier and your child will build and maintain friendships with other children.

What are my legal responsibilities?

Education in New South Wales is compulsory for all children between the ages of six years and below the minimum school leaving age. The *Education Act 1990* requires that parents ensure their children of compulsory school age are enrolled at, and regularly attend school, or, are registered with the Board of Studies, Teaching and Educational Standards for homeschooling.

Once enrolled, children are required to attend school each day it is open for students.

The importance of arriving on time

Arriving at school and class on time:

- Ensures that students do not miss out on important learning activities scheduled early in the day
- Helps students learn the importance of punctuality and routine
- Give students time to greet their friends before class
- Reduces classroom disruption

Lateness is recorded as a partial absence and must be explained by parents.

What if my child has to be away from school?

On occasion, your child may need to be absent from school. Justified reasons for student absences may include:

- being sick, or having an infectious disease
- having an unavoidable medical appointment
- being required to attend a recognised religious holiday
- exceptional or urgent family circumstance (e.g. attending a funeral)

Following an absence from school you must ensure that within 7 days you provide your child's school with a verbal or written explanation for the absence. However, if the school has not received an explanation from you within 2 days, the school may contact you to discuss the absence.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified. When this happens the principal will discuss their decision with you and the reasons why. Principals may request medical certificates or other documentation when frequent or long term absences are explained as being due to illness. Principals may also seek parental permission to speak with medical specialists to obtain information to collaboratively develop a health care plan to support your child. If the request is denied, the principal can record the absences as unjustified.

Travel

Families are encouraged to travel during school holidays. If travel during school term is necessary, discuss this with your child's school principal. An *Application for Extended Leave* may need to be completed. Absences relating to travel will be marked as leave on the roll and therefore contribute to your child's total absences for the year.

In some circumstances students may be eligible to enrol in distance education for travel periods over 50 school days. This should be discussed with your child's school principal.





My child won't go to school. What should I do?

You should contact the principal as soon as possible to discuss the issue and ask for help. Strategies to help improve attendance may include a referral to the school's learning and support team or linking your child with appropriate support networks. The principal may seek further support from the Home School Liaison Program to develop an Attendance Improvement Plan.

What might happen if my child continues to have unacceptable absences?

It is important to understand that the Department of Education and Communities may be required to take further action where children of compulsory school age have recurring numbers of unexplained or unjustified absences from school.

Some of the following actions may be undertaken:

Compulsory Schooling
Conferences

You may be asked, along with your child, to attend a Compulsory Schooling Conference. The conference will help to identify the supports your child may need to have in place so they attend school regularly. The school, parents and agencies will work together to develop an agreed plan (known as Undertakings) to support your child's attendance at school.

• Application to the Children's Court – Compulsory Schooling Order

If your child's attendance at school remains unsatisfactory the Department

may apply to the Children's Court for a *Compulsory Schooling Order*. The Children's Court magistrate may order a Compulsory Schooling Conference to be convened.

Prosecution in the Local Court

School and Department staff remain committed to working in partnership with you to address the issues which are preventing your child's full participation at school. In circumstances where a breach of compulsory schooling orders occurs further action may be taken against a parent in the Local Court. The result of court action can be the imposition of a community service order or a fine.

What age can my child leave school?

All New South Wales students must complete Year 10 or its equivalent. After Year 10, and up until they reach 17 years of age, there are a range of flexible options for students to complete their schooling.

Working in Partnership

The Department of Education and Communities recognises that working collaboratively with students and their families is the best way to support the regular attendance of students at school.

We look forward to working in partnership with you to support your child to fulfil their life opportunities. If a student misses as little as 8 days in a school term, by the end of primary school they'll have missed over a year of school.
